A BILL To enhance protections of civilians during United States
military operations, and for other purposes.
1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4 This Act may be cited as the "Protection of Civilians
5 in Military Operations Act".
6 SEC. 2. SENSE OF CONGRESS.
7 It is the sense of Congress—
8 (1) to commend the Department of Defense for

the measures it has implemented and is currently

1	implementing to prevent, mitigate, track, investigate,
2	learn from, respond to, and report civilian casualties
3	resulting from United States military operations;
4	(2) to agree with the Department that civilian
5	casualties are a tragic and unavoidable part of war,
6	and to recognize that—
7	(A) the Department endeavors to conduct
8	all military operations in compliance with the
9	international law of armed conflict and the laws
10	of the United States, including distinction, pro-
11	portionality, and the requirement to take fea-
12	sible precautions in planning and conducting
13	operations to reduce the risk of harm to civil-
14	ians and other protected persons and objects;
15	and
16	(B) the protection of civilians and other
17	protected persons and objects, in addition to a
18	legal obligation and a strategic interest, is a
19	moral and ethical imperative;
20	(3) that the Department has submitted to Con-
21	gress three successive annual reports on civilian cas-
22	ualties resulting from United States military oper-
23	ations for calendar years 2017, 2018, and 2019, and
24	has updated reports as appropriate; and

1	(4) to recognize the efforts of the Department,
2	both in policy and in practice, to reduce the harm
3	to civilians and other protected persons and objects
4	resulting from United States military operations,
5	and to encourage the Department to make addi-
6	tional progress in—
7	(A) developing at all combatant commands
8	personnel and offices responsible for advising
9	the commanders of such commands, and inte-
10	grating into command strategy, the promotion
11	of observance of human rights and the protec-
12	tion of civilians and other protected persons
13	and objects;
14	(B) finalizing and implementing the policy
15	of the Department relating to civilian casualties
16	resulting from United States military oper-
17	ations, as required by section 936 of the John
18	S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act
19	for Fiscal Year 2019 (10 U.S.C. 134 note);
20	(C) finalizing Department-wide regulations
21	to implement section 1213 of the National De-
22	fense Authorization for Fiscal Year 2020 (Pub-
23	lic Law 116–92) for ex gratia payments for
24	damage, personal injury, or death that is inci-
25	dent to the use of force by the United States

1	Armed Forces, a coalition that includes the
2	United States, a military organization sup-
3	porting the United States, or a military organi-
4	zation supporting the United States or such co-
5	alition; and
6	(D) professionalizing foreign partner forces
7	to reduce civilian casualties, including in con-
8	nection with train and equip programs, advise,
9	assist, accompany, and enable missions, and
10	fully combined and coalition operations.
11	SEC. 3. MODIFICATION OF ANNUAL REPORT ON CIVILIAN
12	CASUALTIES IN CONNECTION WITH UNITED
13	STATES MILITARY OPERATIONS.
14	Section 1057 of the National Defense Authorization
15	Act for Fiscal Year 2018 (10 U.S.C. 113 note) is amend-
16	ed—
17	(1) in subsection (b)—
18	(A) by redesignating paragraphs (2)
19	through (9) as paragraphs (3) through (10), re-
20	spectively;
21	(B) by inserting after paragraph (1) the
22	following new paragraph (2):
23	"(2) A list of each authorized advise, assist, ac-
24	company, and enable mission during the year cov-
25	ered by such report during which civilian casualties

1	or human rights abuses by partner forces were ob-
2	served or later reported.";
3	(C) in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (4),
4	as redesignated by subparagraph (A) of this
5	paragraph, by inserting before the semicolon
6	the following: ", and any measures in place for
7	preventing, mitigating, and responding to the
8	death or injury to civilians that occurs during
9	advise, assist, accompany, and enable missions
10	conducted by United States military personnel";
11	(2) in subsection (d)—
12	(A) in the second sentence, by striking ",
13	and shall be made available" and all that fol-
14	lows and inserting a period; and
15	(B) by adding at the end the following new
16	sentence: "The unclassified form of each report
17	shall be published on an Internet website of the
18	Department available to the public concurrently
19	with its submission to Congress.";
20	(3) by redesignating subsection (e) as sub-
21	section (f): and
22	(4) by inserting after subsection (d) the fol-
23	lowing new subsection (e):
24	"(e) Human Rights Abuses Defined.—In this
25	section the term 'human rights abuses' has the meaning

- 4 SEC. 4. INTEGRITY OF CIVILIAN CASUALTY INVESTIGA-
- 5 TIONS.
- 6 (a) Investigations by Officers Outside Unit
- 7 OR CHAIN OF COMMAND.—A commander in the Armed
- 8 Forces conducting an administrative investigation, com-
- 9 mander directed inquiry, or equivalent investigation on ci-
- 10 vilian casualties resulting from a United States military
- 11 operation that was undertaken by one or more units under
- 12 the command of the commander shall, to the extent prac-
- 13 ticable, select as an officer to conduct such investigation
- 14 an officer in the Armed Forces outside of such units or
- 15 chain of command.
- 16 (b) Separation of Investigative Personnel
- 17 From Personnel Involved in Operations.—The
- 18 military or civilian personnel of the Armed Forces who
- 19 conduct an investigation on civilian casualties resulting
- 20 from a United States military operation shall, to the ex-
- 21 tent practicable, be operationally separate from members
- 22 of the Armed Forces who were directly involved in such
- 23 operation.
- 24 (c) SITE VISITATIONS IN INVESTIGATIONS.—

1	(1) In general.—Each investigation on civil-
2	ian casualties resulting from a United States mili-
3	tary operation shall, to the extent practicable, in-
4	clude a visit (including the interview of civilian sur-
5	vivors and witnesses after their informed consent) by
6	appropriate members of the United States Armed
7	Forces to each site at which civilian casualties were
8	confirmed or reasonably suspected in connection
9	with such operation.
10	(2) Visits by alternative personnel.—If
11	the Secretary of Defense determines that a visit by
12	members of the United States Armed Forces to a
13	site as otherwise required by paragraph (1) is not
14	practicable, the Secretary shall—
15	(A) memorialize, in writing, the justifica-
16	tion for such determination;
17	(B) make every reasonable effort to obtain
18	such a visit by appropriate military or civilian
19	personnel of a partner or coalition military
20	force, or by personnel of the national govern-
21	ment concerned, or a local government, capable
22	of making such a visit in connection with the
23	investigation concerned; and
24	(C) memorialize, in writing—

1	(i) the results of any visit under sub-
2	paragraph (B); or
3	(ii) if no visit could be obtained under
4	that subparagraph, the gaps in evidence in
5	the investigation concerned as a result of
6	the lack of such a visit.
7	SEC. 5. COORDINATION BETWEEN GEOGRAPHIC COMBAT-
8	ANT COMMANDS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF
9	STATE.
10	(a) In General.—Not later than 180 days after the
11	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense
12	shall direct each commander of a geographic combatant
13	command to coordinate with the Department of State to
14	establish and maintain an uninterrupted line of commu-
15	nication between such command and the Chief of Mission
16	(of the Chief's designee) in any country in which such
17	command is conducting military operations in order to as-
18	sist in the response to reports of civilian casualties result-
19	ing from such military operations.
20	(b) PRIMARY OBJECTIVE.—The primary objective of
21	the line of communication under this section shall be to
22	serve as a channel for fielding and coordinating reports
23	of civilian casualties resulting from United States military
24	operations undertaken by the command concerned in the
25	country concerned.

1 SEC. 6. DATABASE ON REPORTS ON INVESTIGATIONS.

- 2 (a) Database Required.—Not later than one year
- 3 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary
- 4 of Defense shall establish and maintain within the Depart-
- 5 ment of Defense a database that preserves and organizes
- 6 reports of the Department on investigations of civilian cas-
- 7 ualties resulting from United States military operations
- 8 (including reports under section 1057 of the National De-
- 9 fense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2018, as amended
- 10 by section 3 of this Act), and the results of such investiga-
- 11 tions.
- 12 (b) SEARCHABILITY.—The database required by sub-
- 13 section (a) shall be searchable by personnel across the De-
- 14 partment.
- (c) AVAILABILITY TO PUBLIC.—The public shall have
- 16 access to, and be able to search, the database required
- 17 by subsection (a) through an Internet website of the De-
- 18 partment that is available to the public. For purposes of
- 19 such access, appropriate information in the database may
- 20 be maintained in a classified annex in the interests of the
- 21 national security of the United States, and access to such
- 22 annex appropriately limited.
- 23 (d) Update.—The database required by subsection
- 24 (a) shall be updated not less frequently than once each
- 25 year.

1	SEC. 7. RESOURCES TO IMPLEMENT DEPARTMENT OF DE-
2	FENSE POLICY ON CIVILIAN CASUALTIES IN
3	CONNECTION WITH UNITED STATES MILI-
4	TARY OPERATIONS.
5	(a) Purpose.—The purpose of this section is to fa-
6	cilitate fulfillment of the requirements in section 936 of
7	the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act
8	for Fiscal Year 2019 (10 U.S.C. 134 note).
9	(b) Personnel.—Not later than 180 days after the
10	date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Defense
11	shall do the following:
12	(1) Add to, and assign within, each of the
13	United States Central Command, the United States
14	Africa Command, the United States Special Oper-
15	ations Command, the United States European Com-
16	mand, the United States Southern Command, the
17	United States Indo-Pacific Command, and the
18	United States Northern Command not fewer than
19	two personnel who shall have primary responsibility
20	for the following in connection with military oper-
21	ations undertaken by such command:
22	(A) Providing guidance and oversight re-
23	lating to prevention of and response to civilian
24	casualties, promotion of observance of human
25	rights, and the protection of civilians and civil-
26	ian infrastructure.

1	(B) Overseeing civilian casualty response
2	functions on behalf of the commander of such
3	command.
4	(C) Receiving reports of civilian casualties
5	and conduct of civilian casualty assessments.
6	(D) Analyzing civilian casualty incidents
7	and trends.
8	(E) Offering condolences for casualties, in-
9	cluding ex gratia payments.
10	(F) Ensuring the integration of activities
11	relating to civilian casualty mitigation, protec-
12	tion of civilians, and promotion of observance of
13	human rights in security cooperation activities.
14	(G) Consulting with non-governmental or-
15	ganizations on civilian casualty and human
16	rights matters.
17	(2) Add to, and assign within, the Office of the
18	Under Secretary for Policy not fewer than two per-
19	sonnel who shall have primary responsibility for im-
20	plementing and overseeing implementation by the
21	components of the Department of Defense of De-
22	partment policy on civilian casualties resulting from
23	United States military operations.

1	(3) Add to, and assign within, the Joint Staff
2	not fewer than two personnel who shall have primary
3	responsibility for the following:
4	(A) Overseeing implementation by the com-
5	ponents of the Department of Defense of De-
6	partment policy on civilian casualties resulting
7	from United States military operations.
8	(B) Developing and sharing in the imple-
9	mentation of such policy.
10	(C) Communicating operational guidance
11	on such policy.
12	(e) Training, Software, and Other Require-
13	MENTS.—
14	(1) In general.—In each of fiscal years 2021
15	through 2023, the Secretary of Defense and each
16	Secretary of a military department may obligate and
17	expend, from amounts specified in paragraph (2),
18	not more than \$5,000,000 for the following:
19	(A) Training related to civilian casualty
20	mitigation and response.
21	(B) Information technology equipment,
22	support and maintenance, and data storage, in
23	order to implement—
24	(i) the policy of the Department re-
25	lated relating to civilian casualties result-

1	ing from United States military operations
2	as required by section 936 of the John S.
3	McCain National Defense Authorization
4	Act for Fiscal Year 2019; and
5	(ii) the database required by section
6	6.
7	(2) Funds.—The funds for a fiscal year speci-
8	fied in this subparagraph are funds as follows:
9	(A) In the case of the Secretary of De-
10	fense, amounts authorized to be appropriated
11	for such fiscal year for operation and mainte-
12	nance, Defense-wide.
13	(B) In the case of a Secretary of a military
14	department, amounts authorized to be appro-
15	priated for such fiscal year for operation and
16	maintenance for the components of the Armed
17	Forces under the jurisdiction of such Secretary.
18	SEC. 8. UNITED STATES MILITARY OPERATIONS DEFINED.
19	In this Act, the term "United States military oper-
20	ations" includes any mission, strike, engagement, raid, or
21	incident involving United States Armed Forces.
